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Q: What is special about your MBA program? And how does it differ from other top MBA programs?

A: The Johnson School's two-year MBA curriculum provides a comprehensive foundation in key business fundamentals while offering the flexibility to customize your studies. You'll get to choose electives, minors, immersion areas, and other learning experiences that align with your career goals. Our program provides flexibility by taking courses in other reputable programs at Cornell, as well as on the Cornell Tech campus on Roosevelt Island in New York City.

Q: Are there any recent changes in the programs or in the admission process? A: Recently, we added the 1+1 program which allows our students from the two-year MBA program the opportunity to complete their first year in Ithaca, with their core courses, followed by the immersion learning program and in their second year enroll at the Cornell Tech campus and take advantage of The Student Curriculum. This program is designed for students with tech experience and who are looking to bridge the gap between business and the digital economy. One change in the admissions process is within our essay prompts. We will allow candidates the opportunity to answer one of two questions. Q: Given the ongoing conflict in Israel and the pro-Palestinian demonstrations on campuses worldwide, how will these factors impact admissions for prospective Israeli students? Additionally, how can you reassure Israeli students who may be worried about studying in your university in the current unstable and challenging situation? A: Cornell University prioritizes <u>student safety and campus conduct</u> with several divisions (e.g. Student & Campus Life, Public Safety) focused on safety and providing services in a comprehensive approach that prioritizes transparency and empathy. Cornell does not tolerate antisemitism, Islamophobia, and all other forms of hate, and takes swift and immediate responses when threats are made to our community. Cornell's <u>statements</u> throughout the past year remind our community that we must all be diligent in our role in fostering a community of belonging, even in the most challenging of times.

Q: Can you share some details about the atmosphere in the school? Amongst the students? Between students and faculty? How do students spend their free time?
A: The Johnson community is a vibrant community, where students, faculty, and staff collaborate in various ways. Whether it's in the classroom, through recruiting opportunities, or during social events we find ways to stay engaged. Our faculty have an

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open-door policy where students can share their thoughts, get advice, and ask for feedback.

During free time, our students are involved in a variety of different <u>clubs and</u> <u>organizations</u>.
